Notes	Arkansas Tech University does not track rates for employment after graduation at the institutional level. The state tracks employment for all degree holders. At this time, evidence is anecdotal, but all students who wish to be employed upon graduation are employed. Most of them are employed within the organization where they completed their internship. Few students decide to take gap years before seeking full time employment.

The Recreation program was established at Arkansas Tech University in 1965 as part of the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER). The first Bachelor of Science degrees in Recreation were conferred in 1966. The Recreation Program was moved out of the HPER Department in 1968. In 2023 the program found a new home in the Department of Agriculture and Tourism.

The Recreation and Park Administration Program was first accredited by the Council on Accreditation National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) and the American Association for Physical Activity and Recreation in 1997. The program was reaccredited in 2002 and 2007, and 2013.
